A STORY IN TREE RINGS



We all know trees grow taller, but did you know they also get wider around the trunk? As a tree grows, it produces new layers of wood just under the bark. When the tree is cut, these periods of growth show up as rings. We can use the rings to date the tree and find clues about past environments.

Early wood – light in color Late wood – dark in color Alternating gives the appearance of "rings"

We can also see big events like droughts and fires in the tree rings.

During a year with lots of water, the tree will grow more, and the ring will be wider.

During dry years, the ring will be narrower.

Dendrochronology, also known as tree-ring dating, is the method of dating based on the study of patterns of tree rings.

Every year, a tree adds a layer of growth just beneath the bark. This growth shows up as rings. **What would** your life look like in tree rings?
