Lazy Daisies, Silk Ribbons, & Spider Webs:

A Discovery Guide for Mary Louise Orr's 1890 Crazy Quilt



Mary Louise Orr lived on Bailey Island, Maine. In 1890 she made a crazy quilt. It took her only one year to complete it.

What is a crazy quilt?

A crazy quilt is a quilt that does not follow a regular pattern. Instead, it has different types of fabrics cut up into small shapes and sewn together to form a fancy design. Very skillful makers decorated their quilts with decorative stitches, flowers made out of silks and velvets, and ribbons signed by friends or famous people.

On the quilt, you will see paintings of animals and ladies that lived on Bailey Island, and if you look closely, you find the many flowers and insects that are stitched on. **Can you find:**


Mary Louise Orr must have liked cats a lot! She put 4 different cats on her quilt. Can you find them? What colors are their collars?
